The REMINDER!



"HOW" to glorify God is NOT a technique! It involves <u>VALUES</u> and <u>CHOICES</u>.

- IF your values/choices do <u>not</u> agree with Scripture, THEN you are <u>not</u> glorifying God. (This means you are <u>not</u> following Jesus.)
- IF this characterizes the way you live, THEN you are not saved.



- 6) WE GLORIFY GOD when we are content in our circumstances.
- This means: We willingly accept what God has brought into our lives.
 - We trust him to accomplish good through it.
- This does NOT mean: We are happy (or content) with <u>sin</u> and injustice.
 - We must oppose sin, whenever we can.

- This does NOT mean: The situation will always be enjoyable.
 - We can admit the truth when things are unpleasant.
- This does NOT mean: We shouldn't change our situation if the opportunity arises.
 - If an opportunity comes our way, we are free to take it or leave it... <u>depending on its impact on</u> <u>our effectiveness in the kingdom of God.</u>

- Followers of Jesus often choose a "less pleasant" option, out of love for others.
 - They consider "maintaining love" to be <u>more</u> <u>important</u> than "maintaining rights."

EXAMPLE: Paul chose to NOT use his rights.

If you support others who preach to you, shouldn't we have an even greater right to be supported?

Yet we have never used this right. We would rather put up with anything than put an obstacle in the way of the Good News about Christ. = An expression of LOVE!

1 Cor. 9:12 (NLT)

EXAMPLE: Paul accepted the "lesser good" for the sake of others.

I feel torn between the two, because I have a desire to depart and be with Christ, which is better by far.

but it is more vital for your sake that I remain in the body. = An expression of LOVE!

Philip. 1:23-24 (NET)

A MODERN EXAMPLE:

Many North Koreans who escape and later become Christians freely <u>choose</u> to return to their country (knowing it will result in death), so that their family and friends might have an

so that their family and friends might have an opportunity to be saved.

- An expression of LOVE!

If <u>anyone</u> had a reason to NOT be content, it was the apostle Paul.

Consider his circumstances:

 At Corinth, certain false "apostles" were trying to exploit the people, claiming to be superior to Paul.

For such people are false apostles, deceitful workers, disguising themselves as apostles of Christ.

2 Cor. 11:13 (NET)

[Paul's example]

 To counteract these false apostles, Paul was forced to "brag" about himself – <u>against his will</u>.

This is what he says <u>after</u> he is done with his boasting:

I have become a fool. You yourselves forced me to do it, for I should have been commended by you.

For I lack nothing in comparison to those "super-apostles," even though I am <u>nothing.</u>

2 Cor. 12:11 (NET)

"I AM NOTHING"?
WHY DID HE CLAIM THIS?
Let's see!

[Paul's example]

- As we shall see, Paul's "boasts" were quite unlike those
 of the fakes: His "boasts" were about his <u>weakness</u>,
 rather than his <u>strength!</u>
- WHY? This is because <u>his power was from God, not from himself!</u>

So then, I will boast most gladly about my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may reside in me.

2 Cor. 12:9b (NET)

WHAT SPECIFICALLY DID HE BOAST ABOUT?
Let's see!

[Paul's example]

 His first sentence sounds as though he's going to be bragging about his greatness...

Are they servants of Christ? (I am talking like I am out of my mind!) I am even more so: ...

2 Cor. 11:23a (NET)

- But "greatness" for a follower of Jesus is quite unlike the world's concept of "greatness."
- So imagine the Corinthians' surprise, when Paul continues...

[Paul's example] with much greater labors, with far more imprisonments, with more severe beatings, facing death many times. Five times I received from the Jews forty lashes less one. Three times I was beaten with a rod. Once I received a stoning. Three times I suffered shipwreck. A night and a day I spent adrift

2 Cor. 11:23b-25 (NET)

[Paul's example]

I have been on journeys many times, in dangers from rivers, in dangers from robbers, in dangers from my own countrymen, in dangers from Gentiles,

in dangers in the city, in dangers in the wilderness, in dangers at sea, in dangers from false brothers,

in hard work and toil, through many sleepless nights, in hunger and thirst, many times without food, in cold and without enough clothing.

= Willing to endure, because of LOVE! 2 Cor. 11:26-27 (NET)

[Paul's example] Apart from other things, there is the daily pressure on me of my anxious concern for all the churches. Who is weak, and I am not weak? Who is led into sin, and I do not burn with indignation? = An expression of LOVE! 2 Cor. 11:28-29 (NET) (Unlike the fakes, he really cares about the people!) WHAT WAS PAUL'S ATTITUDE IN ALL THIS?

in the open sea.

= Willing to endure, because of LOVE!

 He knew that God's <u>power</u> expressed itself through his weakness! And that determined his attitude.

But [God] said to me, "My grace is enough for you, for my **power** is made perfect in weakness."

So then, I will boast most gladly about my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may reside in me.

Therefore I am content with weaknesses, with insults, with troubles, with persecutions and difficulties for the sake of Christ, for whenever I am weak, then I am strong.

2 Cor. 12:9-10 (NET)

· He learned something that most people haven't. Here he plans to teach it to us:

I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances.

I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want.

I can do everything through him who gives me strength.

Philip. 4:11b-13 (NIV)

· He knew that God's goal is to accomplish our permanent, eternal good.

And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose.

Romans 8:28 (NIV)

· Attaining this "good" may require us to experience temporary "not-so-good" ... just like it required JESUS.

[Jesus], who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.

Hebrews 12:2 (NIV)



SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS FOR BAD CIRCUMSTANCES.

- IF your circumstances are caused by your own sins:
 Some of the resulting consequences may be unchangeable in this life.
 - Repent and accept the consequences.
 - Trust God to accomplish ultimate good.

The thief on the cross illustrates this:

"We are punished justly, for we are getting what our deeds deserve. But this man [Jesus] has done nothing wrong."

Luke 23:41 (NIV)

SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS FOR BAD CIRCUMSTANCES.

- IF your circumstances are due to situations beyond your control: (other's sins, random "time and chance," etc.)
 What Scripture says still holds true, regardless of cause.
 - Be faithful to God and remain content.
 - No matter what happens now, you will be rewarded at the Day of Justice.

What Jesus says to you:

Be faithful, even to the point of death, and I will give you the crown of life.

Rev. 2:10b (NIV)

YOUR MISSION: Consider & Choose

CONSIDER:

- Your flesh (sinful nature) <u>does NOT want</u> contentment.
- If you are saved, your Spirit (which comes from God) <u>does want</u> contentment.

CHOOSE: The way that best expresses who (or what) controls you!
