

Should we do? ⇒ SAY THE BIBLE CAN'T ⇒ GIVE UP? BE UNDERSTOOD? ⇒ PANIC? **⇒** DECIDE THE BIBLE ⇒ THROW AWAY THE BIBLE? IS UNRELIABLE? ⇒ INVENT OUR OWN ⇒ LOSE HOPE? INTERPRETATION?

There is an answer!



A good way to respond!



First of all, realize that ...

- ✓ Our lack of understanding: It doesn't mean the original readers didn't understand it.
- ✓ What we should expect: Some portions of Scripture will be more difficult than others.
- ✓ We must be careful: We must not distort what we don't understand.

[Paul's] letters contain some things that are hard to understand, which ignorant and unstable people distort, as they do the other Scriptures, to their own destruction.

2 Peter 3:16b (NIV)

⇒ VOTE

ON IT?

What should we do? START HERE!

1. Pay attention to the context!

Paying attention to issues such as:

- ✓ Who the speaker and readers were.
- ✓ The word choice, purpose, circumstances for writing.
- ✓ The time and place when and where it was written.
- ✓ What the nearby verses say the context.

This will resolve many questions and eliminate many misunderstandings.

2. Make it your goal to neither add to, nor subtract from, what Scripture says.



Not just when you aren't sure about a passage, but <u>any</u> time ... and <u>every</u> time!

Every word of God proves true. ... Do not add to his words, or he may rebuke you, and you will be found a liar.

Proverbs 30:5a, 6 (NLT)

Do not add or subtract a thing to what I'm commanding you. Observe the commands of the LORD your God.

Deut. 4:2 (ISV)

Adding and subtracting could have serious consequences.

And I solemnly declare to everyone who hears the prophetic words of this book: If anyone adds anything to what is written here, God will add to that person the plagues described in this book.

And if anyone removes any of the words of this prophetic book, God will remove that person's share in the tree of life and in the holy city that are described in this book.

Rev. 22:18-19 (NLT)

3. You may want to do some research, to find out *what* others say... and *why* they say it.

Research may give you valuable information, but YOU ALSO NEED TO BE CAREFUL!

- ✓ A view may sound good, but be based on faulty reasoning!
- ✓ False religions (cults, etc.) often present false interpretations of Scripture, to fit their heretical views.



Sometimes the <u>reason</u> people reach their conclusion is the most valuable information!

Ultimately, you will have to compare your $\underline{\textit{research}}$ to $\underline{\textit{Scripture}}$.



- √ Research is *opinion*; God's Word is *true!*
- ✓ Follow the example of those who examined <u>Paul's</u> words, to see if they agreed with Scripture.
 (They found out that Paul did agree with Scripture.)

They were very willing to receive the message, and every day they carefully examined the Scriptures to see if those things were so.

Act 17:11b (ISV)

4. If you are still uncertain about the passage's meaning, it's OK!

There are many other Scripture passages that you will find easier to understand.

➤ If you are willing to take the time to understand them.

The meaning of some specific verse <u>will not</u> <u>contradict</u> the rest of God's Word!

If you look elsewhere in Scripture, you might find similar things expressed in easier-to-understand ways.





When you say you "don't understand" a verse, make sure it's not simply a matter of <u>not liking what it says!</u> EXAMPLE:

Those who have been born from God don't live sinful lives.

What God has said lives in them, and they can't live sinful lives. They have been born from God.

1 John 3:9 (GW)

I THINK SAVED PEOPLE <u>CAN</u> KEEP ON SINNING.

Think about it...


Did God's kindness have any effect on you, when you were his enemy?

"BURNING COALS"?

What could that mean?

THE CONTEXT

This verse is a quote from Proverbs 25:21-22:

If your enemy is hungry, give him food to eat; if he is thirsty, give him water to drink. In doing this, you will heap burning coals on his head, and the LORD will reward you.

What exactly does it mean to "heap burning coals on his head"? Interpretations vary, depending on one's understanding of Old Testament culture. (See below.) But Paul makes sure that there is *no mistake* in understanding his intention, by telling us his intention in the verse that follows!

Romans 12:21:

Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

This is the same thing that *Jesus* requires from us!

Matthew 5:44-45a:

But I tell you: Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, that you may be sons of your Father in heaven.

Luke 6:27-28:

But I tell you who hear me: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you.

"COALS OF FIRE" - SOME POSSIBLE INTERPRETATIONS:

Here are two suggested interpretations of the what the "coals of fire" might signify:

- 1) In many cultures at that time, fire was considered very important. Hot embers could be carried from place to place in containers. In some instances, an insulated container may have been carried on the individual's head. (Then he would not be in danger of burns from the *rising* heat.) According to this view, the emphasis would be on the *good* we are to do, especially when the other person is in need.
- 2) This statement could also be reminiscent of an Egyptian ritual signifying "repentance." According to this view, the good that we do would (hopefully) bring shame and repentance to the person. The focus would be on the "mental pain" the person had, rather than on the physical pain that would be experienced, if the live coals were to actually touch his head.

This second view is probably the more predominant view among commentators (whether or not they make reference to the Egyptian ritual). But either way, the context shows us that our goal is to do good to the evildoer - in the hope that he will repent. We want him to become our friend, rather than our enemy. (The verse is definitely *not* an encouragement for us to hope that he will have a "hotter fire in hell" - that is, that more coals will be "heaped upon his head"!)
